
What is Croatia famous for?











Croatian olive oil

A total of 51 out of 61 Croatian olive oils won gold, silver or bronze medals in New York at the world's largest olive oil competition, including one 'Best in Class' award.

Šoltansko maslinovo ulje from the island of Šolta was the only olive from Croatia to win a 'Best in Class' award. Only 18 olive oils 18 out of 913 from 26 countries were given this award. 


The necktie or cravat was first worn by Croatian soldiers in the European Thirty Year War (1618-1648).

EDUCATION SYSTEM

EDUCATION POLICY IN CRO




- Education in Croatia, the most recent member state of EU (few years), is mainly provided by public sector.
- The supreme body for primary and secondary education as well as for the Universities is Ministry for science, education and sport.
- Low regional independence-centralization

ORGANISATION OF EDUCATION AND CARE

- EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND CARE
- PRIMARY SCHOOL
- SECONDARY SCHOOL
- HIGHER EDUCATION

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND CARE

- optional (from 6 m to 6 yo)
- parents pay costs (less in richer cities and places)



PRIMARY SCHOOL

- compulsory (from 6 to 15 yo)
- eight (soon nine) grades
- free of charge for the beneficiaries / including school books from next year @
- teacher chose textbooks from list which are approved by Ministry for science and education
- expected learning outcomes are prescribed by the National Curriculum Framework

SECONDARY SCHOOL

- optional
- secondary education begins by enrolment into high school via the Internet system
- free of charge for the beneficiaries but parents must buy school books and transition to school (but Ministry and local governments help with costs)
- secondary education enables students to acquire knowledge and competencies to work or to continue education.
- secondary schools last from 3 to 5 years
- depending on the type:
 - grammar schools,
 - vocational schools and
 - art schools.

HIGHER EDUCATION

- study in Croatia is mostly financed by government, according to the planned quota of students
- in academic year 2005/6 Bologna Process was implemented
- Croatia has eight universities:
 - University of Zagreb, University of Split, University of Rijeka, University of Osijek, University of Zadar, University of Dubrovnik, University of Pula and Dubrovnik International University.

LEVEL OF EDUCATION NEEDED TO WORK IN EDUCATION SYSTEM IN CRO

- EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND CARE educators (bachelor's degrees)
- PRIMARY SCHOOL teachers (master's degrees)
- SECONDARY SCHOOL teachers (master's degrees)
- HIGHER EDUCATION teachers (doctorate)

TEACHERS AND EDUCATION STAFF IN PRIMARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL

- teachers in Croatia are public employees
- teachers have possibility of professional progression through two levels:
 - teacher mentor,
 - teacher advisor.
- <u>*benefits:</u> better salary, status...
- **obligations: cooperation with the ministry...)
